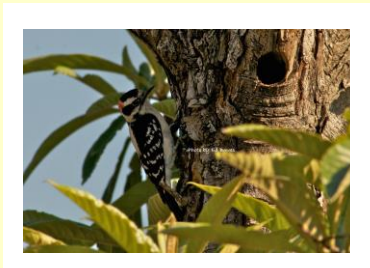

Citizen Science

Thank you to everyone who participated in the October Big Day! To see the complete stats for the world, by hemisphere, and by continent, visit this [link](#). For Florida, 275 species were counted; the state came in #4 in the U.S. for species counted.

Our chapter goal was to count 100 species, but we did not quite get that many. The results for St. Lucie County were:

- 86 species counted
- 38 eBird lists submitted
- 25 people submitted lists
- Top number of species—Adella Blacka at 51!
- Ed Bowes counted 37 species
- Ellen Lynch counted 33 species

SAVE THE DATE: Christmas Bird Count will be held Saturday, December 16—rain or shine. Please mark your calendars and watch for more info from Ed Bowes.

Project Feederwatch starts November 1st and runs through April 29th! You can count the birds that visit your backyard feeders all winter and report these counts to the Cornell Lab of Ornithology. Feathered Friends

One of the birds recorded for the St. Lucie County October Big Day was a Black-crowned Night-Heron (*Nycticorax nycticorax*). *Nycticorax* means “night raven,” and refers to the primarily nocturnal feeding habits of these birds. The croaking, crow-like call of Black-crowned Night-Herons also fits the name.

Black-crowned Night-Herons are most active at night or at dusk, which makes them a bit more challenging to find. During the day, they are usually seen in a roost or lurking in the shadows of mangrove roots. They can be found in fresh, salt, and brackish wetlands and marshes.

Black-crowned Night-Herons are stocky birds with short legs, compared to other herons. They have a heavy black bill, yellow legs, grayish-white underparts, gray wings, and a dark gray cap and back. Adults also have a long white head plume. Juveniles are similar in shape with a heavy dark bill and overall brown and white spotting.

Black-crowned Night-Herons are opportunistic feeders, meaning they will eat a wide variety of terrestrial, freshwater, and marine organisms. Their diet includes worms, fish, mollusks, lizards, snakes, turtles, rodents, birds, and eggs. They also eat carrion, plant material, and garbage. This means you could spot one of these birds near roadkill or at a landfill at the right time of day.

You will have to be patient and quiet in order to find one of these herons. Some of the best places to see them in St. Lucie County are Ocean Bay Riverside Park, Teague Hammock Preserve, Pinelands Preserve, Savannas Preserve State Park, and the wetlands on Summerlin RD. One may occasionally be spotted along a canal or in a swale in the western portions of the county. So keep your eyes open at dusk when you are traveling through the right habitat; you could see a Black-crowned Night-Heron!

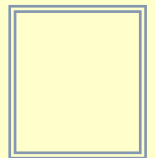
