

On February 2nd, we celebrate a habitat that is central to human wellbeing—wetlands. Friday, Feb. 2 is <u>World Wetlands Day</u>. The day marks the anniversary of the Ramsar Convention on Wetlands, an international treaty signed in 1971. The purpose of World Wetlands Day is to raise awareness and increase people's understanding of the critical importance of wetlands to wildlife and humans. Wetlands are vital for protecting water quality and for sustaining food and breeding sites for many species. Please do your part to decrease pollution of wetlands, join in efforts to protect wetlands from development, and support wetlands restoration.



Have you been treated to the spectacular site of Roseate Spoonbills (*Platalea ajaja*)? There are only two "big pink birds" seen in this part of Florida, and the most common is the Roseate Spoonbill (the other is a rare Caribbean Flamingo). All Roseate Spoonbills have white neck, upper back, and upper breast feathers with varying shades of pink on the wings and lower portions of the body. During breeding season, a brilliant carmine patch develops on the wing-and tail-coverts. Juvenile spoonbills lack this bright wing patch and begin life with feathers on their head. As birds approach maturity, they lose the head feathers and birds of breeding age have bald pale green heads.

Spoonbills possess a uniquely shaped bill that looks like a large spoon or spatula. They feed by sweeping the partially open spoon back-and-forth in a semicircle through shallow water in search of small prey items. When prey contacts the spoon, the bill snaps shut in a process called "tactolocation." Roseate Spoonbills feed in all types of water—fresh, brackish, and salt—as long at the water is less than 12-inches deep. Primary food items are small fish, crustaceans, and aquatic insects.

Breeding season begins in November in the Florida Keys and typically lasts until March, advancing north over time. The birds nest in or near a colony on small islands or in trees overhanging water. Spoonbills are known to abandon their nests with significant human disturbance, including heavy boat traffic. Florida lists these birds as a Species of Special Concern due to habitat degradation and human disturbance issues. So, if you see Roseate Spoonbills in the wild, *especially* in a breeding colony, please keep a respectful distance and maintain quiet. We do not want to lose the "Flame Bird!"
